Frankly speaking



We hope this issue of *Visions* provides the kind of information you need to understand our budget. The budget is really a reflection of the work we are doing. It does not represent all we are doing as churches and individuals; however, it is a good starting point.

When I became your Coordinator six years ago, approximately 12 churches were giving to CBF of Georgia and 134 were giving to National CBF. This past budget year 119 churches gave to CBF of Georgia and 162 gave to National CBF.

That means 43 of the churches who gave to National CBF did not give to CBF of Georgia. People often ask me why the difference. I am not sure. I assume it is because many people do not understand that giving to one (National CBF) does not automatically mean giving to the other (CBF of Georgia). Churches or individuals can give to both if they write two checks or if they instruct one organization to pass a portion on to the other organization.

In the beginning some of the churches decided on a formula for funding that did not include the state organization and they have just not revisited the issue. I encourage churches in this category to take a second

look at the state organization. We are doing much more than was possible ten years ago.

This issue is also true with individuals. Writing two checks or instructing one CBF organization to send a portion of your gift on to the other CBF organization is the way to go if you want to support both the state and national group.

We should not forget the special offerings collected by National CBF and CBF of Georgia. National has the Global Missions Offering. This is promoted year round and corresponds to what was once called home and foreign missions. The CBF of Georgia State Ministries Offering is also year round and provides a special way in which additional support can be given to special projects in Georgia.

If you have a question concerning the way your church supports CBF financially, let me know. I will do my best to provide you with accurate and up-to-date information. Please know that every dollar you give to CBF is greatly appreciated.

and we all counted them. It was because of those guards that we were afraid and left you alone."

At this point in the sermon, one of the men in the congregation jumped to his feet, interrupted the missionary, and asked if he could tell him the exact day this happened.

The missionary told the congregation the date, and the man who interrupted told him this story:

"On the night of your incident in Africa, it was morning here and as I was preparing to go play golf, I felt the overwhelming urge to pray for you. In fact, the urging of the Lord was so strong I called men in this church to meet with me here in the sanctuary to pray for you. Would all of those men who met with me on that day stand up?"

The men who had met together to pray that day stood up, all 26 of them.

This story is an incredible example of how the Spirit of the Lord moves in powerful ways as His people pray.

I tell this story because we need people to pray for the Mission Initiatives of the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship of Georgia. Your prayers will make a difference. A MISSIONARY ON FURLOUGH told this true story while visiting his home church in Michigan:

While serving at a small field hospital in Africa, every two weeks I traveled by bicycle through the jungle to a nearby city for supplies. This was a journey of two days and required camping overnight. On one of these journeys, I arrived in the city where I planned to collect money from a bank, purchase medicine and supplies, and then begin my two-day journey back to the field hospital.

Upon arrival in the city, I observed two men fighting; one of the men had been seriously injured. I treated him for his injuries and at the same time talked to him about the Lord.

I then traveled two days, camping overnight, and arrived home without incident. Two weeks later I repeated my journey. Upon arriving in the city, I was approached by the young man I had treated. He told me that he had known I carried money and medicines.

The young man said, "Some friends and I followed you into the jungle, knowing you would camp overnight. We planned to kill you and take your money and drugs. But just as we were about to move into your camp, we saw that you were surrounded by 26 armed guards."

At this, I laughed and said that I was certainly all alone in that jungle campsite. The young man pressed the point, however, and said, "No, sir, I was not the only person to see the guards, my friends also saw them,

In fiscal year 2002-2003, 119 churches participated in giving to CBF of Georgia. So that you may celebrate the participation of your church in CBF of Georgia ministries, contributing churches are listed here.

This is not an attempt to identify each church as a “CBF of Georgia Church.” It includes churches that:

- sent money to National CBF and requested a portion be forwarded to CBF of Georgia,
- sent money directly to CBF of Georgia through their budget, or
- sent money directly to CBF of Georgia because they allow individual members to designate offerings to various causes, including CBF of Georgia.

Individuals who sent their gifts personally to CBF of Georgia are not included; neither are churches that sent gifts only to National CBF.

How CBF of Georgia Partners with You

- You provide scholarships for ministerial students. This year four men and women have received financial assistance from CBF of Georgia.
- You provide placement assistance to local churches looking for staff and also ministers who are seeking places to serve.
- You provide the *Visions* newsletter to over 7,000 households.
- You provide funds for our state functions — General Assembly in March, State Meeting at the National General Assembly, and Fall Convocation.
- You provide financial assistance to new churches in Georgia. In addition to start-up costs of the church, you provide assessment of the planter and family, coaching by an experienced church planter, and boot camp for the planter. You enable CBF of Georgia to repeat this process as the search for planters continues.

- You enable us to “tell the story” to individuals and groups in person, in writing, and through the internet.
- You contribute toward paying staff salaries, covering the utilities at our office, buying and maintaining computers and other office equipment, paying the phone bill, and reimbursing travel expenses. You help purchase office supplies that keep us up and running.

- You provide funds for two weekends of March Mission Madness, three weeks of Touching Taliaferro with Love Summer Day Camp, and two weeks of New Horizons Camp.
- You provide support for CBF of Georgia partners in ministry: Associated Baptist Press, Baptist Center for Ethics, *Baptists Today* and Baptist Women in Ministry of Georgia.
- You support training through co-sponsorship of educational conferences.
- You provide a water filtration system and a medically equipped boat for communities in Sumatra.
- You send Bible teachers and books to Bosnia.
- You helped secure land to build a community center in Taliaferro County.
