

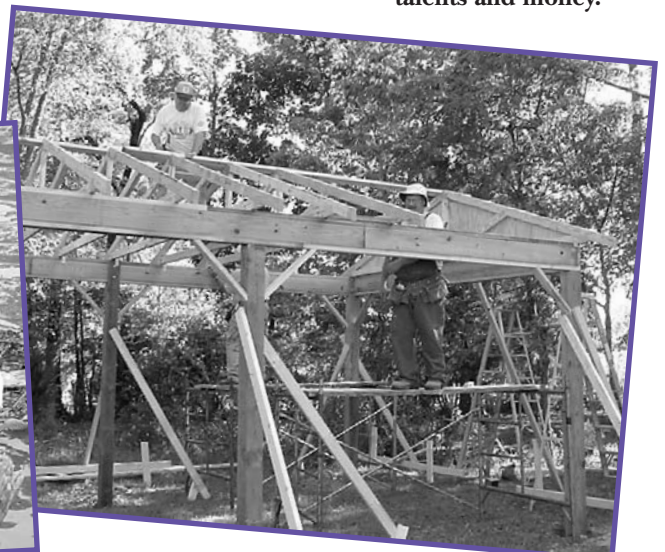

- You provide scholarships for ministerial students at McAfee and Candler Schools of Theology.
- You provide placement assistance to local churches looking for staff and also ministers who are seeking places to serve.

- You contribute toward paying staff salaries, covering the utilities at our office, buying and maintaining computers and other office equipment, paying the phone bill, and reimbursing travel expenses. You help purchase office supplies that keep us up and running.
- You provide funds for a week of New Horizons Camp, two weekends of March Mission Madness, and three weeks of Touching Taliaferro with Love Summer Day Camp.
- You provide support for CBF of Georgia partners in ministry: Associated Baptist Press, Baptist Center for Ethics, *Baptists Today*, Baptist Women in Ministry of Georgia, and the Baptist History and Heritage Society.
- You support training through co-sponsorship of educational conferences, leadership academies and programs, and Taste and See luncheons.
- You provide a water filtration system and a medically equipped boat for communities in Sumatra.
- You send Bible teachers and books to Bosnia.
- You helped secure land to build a community center in Taliaferro County.

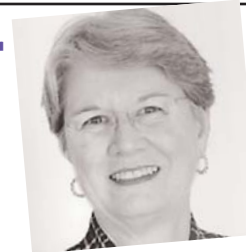

CBF of Georgia has made a monumental step in our initiative in Taliaferro County. In a partnership with Touching Taliaferro with Love and Shorter College, a full scholarship was granted to a graduating senior from Taliaferro County High School. This was a first for the school in their third year of graduating a senior class. For 20 years, they did not have a high school in their county.

She has worked in the CBF of Georgia TTWL Summer Day Camp for three years. This year she served as a staff member. The recipient of the scholarship can attend Shorter for all four years and must agree to spend two years invested in Taliaferro County

after graduation.

There is significant progress being made in Taliaferro County through the dedicated people from CBF of Georgia churches who are serving there in so many ways. I thank you for your gifts and involvement in this important project.

Partnering is one of the ways Fellowship Baptists are able to do effective ministry in this complex world in which we live. Partnering is our way of building, not burning, bridges. Partnering is our admission that we don't know all there is to know about everything. It keeps us honest about what we can do and what we cannot do. Partnering frees us from the desire to control or limit what God can do. Partnering creates.

These days are full of creative partnerships for CBF of Georgia. Recently the Education Committee voted to join with National CBF and the North Carolina-based Center for Congregational Health to provide leadership development for clergy in the first years of ministry. Every year, six Georgia ministers will have the opportunity to participate in this development process. CBF of Georgia's investment in future generations of ministers is just one way that we are seeking to strengthen and encourage the formation of healthy congregations.

Another recent partnership opportunity is with the Baptist Center for Ethics (BCE). CBF of Georgia is proud

to support BCE in the creation of an online, undated, adult Sunday School curriculum unit. Based on the book of Acts, the mission-focused study is being written by twelve Baptists from the global community, including leadership from the Baptist World Alliance, German, Bulgarian, and Canadian Baptists, and a CBF missionary. The unit will challenge us as Baptists to assess our mission strategies and priorities in the changing world landscape. 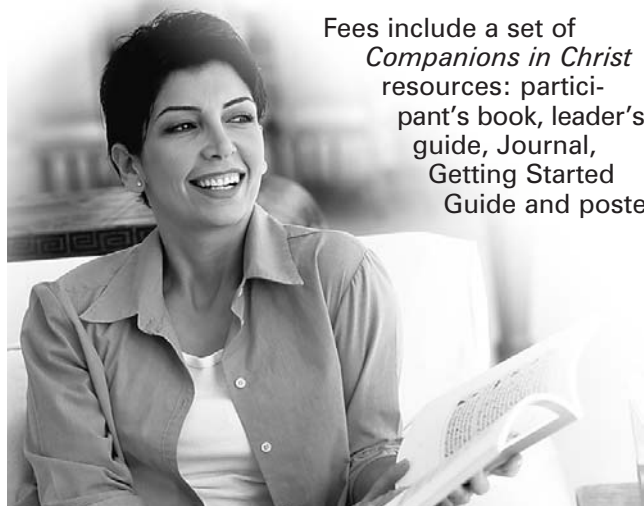
