## Morningstar Treatment Services reaps benefits of your support

COOPERATIVE BAPTIST FELLOWSHIP OF GEORGIA has proven its partnership skills with Morningstar Treatment Services, Inc., and Morningstar Baptist Foundation, Inc. Morningstar Youth Estate Campus (MYEC) hosts an average of two thousand volunteers each summer, most of whom represent CBF churches in Georgia. Morningstar is grateful for the financial support provided by CBF of Georgia. Perhaps the greatest gift has been CBF of Georgia's role as a "conduit" for mission work on the MYEC in Brunswick. We have used CBF money to purchase materials, and volunteers have brought their own supplies on some occasions. Volunteer workers have made capital improvements to the campus with value exceeding \$500,000. Morningstar Academy, "the blue building" (photo above), houses part of the on-campus school at MYEC. Highland Hills Baptist Church in

Macon, among other volunteer groups, helped to paint the "blue building" which was historically known as the post office for Boys Estate. A teller or postmaster window with iron bars can be seen in the building. Our on-campus school serves the special education needs of most of the residents. As children make progress in their treatment, they can go to off-campus school, a much coveted privilege.

A greenhouse, built by First Baptist Church of Rome, will allow residents

**YOU PROVIDE ASSISTANCE to new churches in Georgia.**

"Hola!

"When I started the Rainbow of Love Ministry in Newnan, I brought with me a suitcase filled with dreams, hopes, and energy. Thus, I started my journey; soon I realized after months of trying to relate to Hispanic Baptist Churches (SBC), where men are pastors, I always found an impenetrable wall where women, called to serve God as pastors, are not welcome. Nevertheless, I continued my journey with my suitcase filled with dreams, trusting in God, and knowing that one day long ago, He called me to bring women and men to Christ.

"Through God's plan one day Dr. Joel Richardson of Central Baptist Church of Newnan gave me the phone number of Frank Broome. Since our first conversation, I was welcomed and supported by him. My walk with CBF/GA, although not long in time, has been a good time because I have been receiving blessings through the CBF/GA.

"Last year I received a scholarship to participate in the Mercer Preaching Consultation. I felt the calling of Christ in each speaker. Christ's presence in their ministry was an inspiration to me. In addition, I was supported by CBF/GA with the presence of Suzanne Powell in the first ordination of deacons, two women and two men, in our church. Suzanne brought a special message from Frank Broome and from CBF/GA. Our service was mostly in Spanish, but we trusted the Holy Spirit to help Suzanne understand that 'tongue.'

"As our church was developing, we were aware that we should enhance our financial capabilities by installing a computerized financial program - one more phone call to Frank! Suzanne Powell came to our aid once again. She spent time with me in Newnan, teaching me how to use the Quick Books program. She was so patient!

"I must say that in my journey now, I have partners in Christ who help me to carry my suitcase, still full of dreams, callings, and hopes."

**YOU SUPPORT WOMEN PASTORS and Baptist women in ministry across Georgia.**

"When I arrived in Georgia two and one-half years ago to serve my first pastorate at Fellowship Baptist Church in Edison, I felt a long, long way from home. I was moving from a Washington, DC, suburb after over twenty years. I had also recently graduated from the Baptist Theological Seminary of Richmond (BTSR) in Virginia. Shortly after my arrival in Georgia, I attended the CBF of Georgia Fall Convocation and discovered two of my fellow BTSR graduates, as well as other very familiar faces. It began to feel more like home.

"Before long, Frank Broome invited me to Macon to get acquainted with CBF of Georgia and to meet with him, Devita Parnell, and Surelle Pinkston. They all welcomed me to Georgia and encouraged me and assured me of their support for my ministry here. In September, I was offered a scholarship to attend the Mercer Preaching Consultation on St. Simons Island. I was one of four Baptist women pastors to be offered this scholarship through the CBF of Georgia, Mercer University, McAfee School of Theology, and The Center for Baptist Studies at Mercer. This generous assistance made it possible for me to attend an excellent event and meet even more Georgia Baptists.

"Although I traveled several hundred miles to serve the Lord in Edison, Georgia, CBF of Georgia and Frank Broome have certainly made me feel welcome. They have affirmed my ministry and provided on-going encouragement and assistance to me and to my congregation. **\$** 815,721.00 was given to CBF of Georgia during the 2004 – 2005 fiscal year!

Our fiscal year ended May 31st. The August/September issue of *Visions* is the traditional time we give a detailed report of the previous year. Last year our budget was \$557,700.00. We spent slightly more than that—the total being \$594,827.00. However, we received more than expected. One hundred and thirty-eight churches contributed \$585,744.00 to the budget. An additional \$46,007.00 was given by individuals to the budget for a total of \$631,751.00. This is good news for those of us who like to stay in the black.

What about designated income? This is income given by churches or individuals for specific projects. It also includes cost recovery fees paid by participants. This past year we received \$183,970.00 in designated income. \$94,974.00 came from churches, \$35,075.00 came from individuals,

and \$53,921.00 came from foundations.

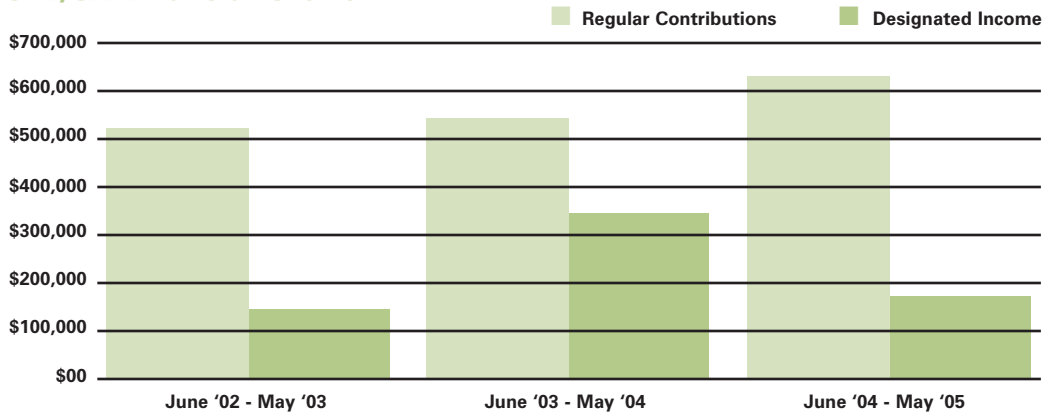
When all types of income are counted, our total receipts this past year were \$815,721.00. We are indeed grateful for the support we have received.

Churches and individuals were busy giving to National CBF, as well. Last year churches in Georgia gave \$4,288,352.63 to the National CBF budget. In addition to that, \$622,500.00 was given to Global Missions and \$384,000.00 was given to the Tsunami relief effort.

Such generosity makes one proud to be associated with CBF contributors in Georgia.

“The churches and individuals in Georgia who contributed to CBF Global Missions this year have enabled significant Gospel work to be accomplished. Not only have our partners in Georgia increased giving to the Offering for Global Missions (\$622,500.00 total to date), but you have also responded generously to the unforeseen disasters caused by the Tsunami in South Asia (\$384,000.00).

“Recently I walked through a village on the Southern Thailand coast which had been completely wiped out by the tsunami waves. A few men were working alongside CBF volunteers to make bricks to rebuild their homes. The equipment and supplies were

provided through your gifts. Elderly women and children were still hiding in the hill regions for fear of a repeated tsunami, and more importantly, from fear of the spirits of the thousands of dead villagers whose bodies were still not recovered. Unrecovered bodies which had been swept away by the tidal wave are believed to roam the area, unsettled because of the lack of proper burial or cremation. Fear and superstition are constant companions to hunger and thirst and lack of shelter and an uncertain future.

“Your gifts to the CBF budget and to the Offering for Global Missions enabled us to have people in the region who had long-term relationships with government officials and village leaders. They speak the language, understand

the cultures, and share the pain and suffering of the local people. Then, when you gave to the Tsunami Relief, the funds were channeled in effective, efficient ways through field personnel. Other relief organizations turned to CBF for help in distributing relief supplies.

“Now our presence in the region has taken on new purpose. We are helping rebuild lives, habitats, and livelihoods. The help you have funded is making lasting, meaningful differences in the people.

“Thank you for your generosity and for your partnership in the Gospel. Together, we are CBF.”

## From our associate coordinator for congregational life



**J**esus once said: “For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also” (Matt. 6:21). Someone else said it another way—a quick look at one’s checkbook reveals a great deal about what an individual values. Both statements of truth give us great insight regarding priorities. If you were to take a glance, not only at the CBF of Georgia checkbook, but also the calendar, you would see that we take seriously the individual. This means we listen to YOU and your needs over the phone, through email, or in person over a cup of coffee or a meal. We listen to your needs for more training and equipping, more opportunities for connectedness with one another and our world, and more quality resources.

In response to these requests for MORE and with the help of some key individuals, we have seen multiple professional networks take shape around the state. In January, children’s ministers and music/worship leaders gathered separately in the Atlanta area. They also met together in March at the General Assembly in Rome as did pastors, chaplains, student ministers, ministerial spouses, and education leaders. At the beginning of June, chaplains from around the state met at the CBF of Georgia office and heard from Ron King, executive director of the Pastoral Institute in Columbus. As I write, education leaders and children’s ministers are planning network gatherings for later in August (see insert for details). Last week I heard from a pastor in the middle Georgia area who desires more fellowship and opportunities for professional development. Together we are working to form a support group for like-minded ministers.

I envision both clergy and laity involved in these networks, with a common goal—to strengthen the congregation’s

ministry. In coming together for support, the exchange of ideas, and continuing education, those charged with the task of directing the ministries of our congregations will be better equipped to lead. I am excited about this development within CBF of Georgia and the opportunity to invest in the future.

## From our moderator

**W**hy should you and I contribute at least 10% of our gross income to God’s work? Most of you would probably respond in similar but different ways. Some possibilities that work for me: God’s Word tells us to, and I want to be obedient to Him; He gave me all I am and have, and what I return to Him is really only token recognition of what He did and does for us; it gives me joy, and we all know God loves a cheerful giver (the Bible says so); and finally, a lifetime of experience has taught me that when I give freely, generously, and joyously, I reap blessings that far exceed my meager gifts.

But, you say, there are lots of ways to contribute to Kingdom work. Why should you give to the CBF of Georgia? Some answers that work for me: I like being part of a fellowship that serves Christians and churches as they



“discover and fulfill their God-given mission” (our purpose). I like being part of a fellowship that shares a “passion for the Great Commission and a commitment to Baptist principles of faith and practice” (our mission). And, I like being part of a fellowship whose vision is “being the presence of Christ in the world.” Beyond that, I’ve studied our budgets and actual expenditures, and I like what I see. I truly believe that the CBF of Georgia exercises good stewardship of the money you and God entrust to us.

So, as you read this budget-oriented issue of *Visions*, please consider whether you should give to the CBF of Georgia more of what God has given you!

# CBF of Georgia Financial Growth



I have seen continuous financial growth in my first year with CBF of Georgia. As you know, when you grow, changes occur. To adjust for that growth, we are continuously developing policies and procedures to assure our contributors that we are handling funds correctly. To that end, we have established a set of procedures for processing contributions and paying bills. A summary of our procedures is as follows:

- Nancy Copeland, Assistant for Communication and Resources, gathers the mail and delivers it to the coordinator.
- The coordinator opens and separates the mail. He then reviews the contributions, bank statements, and bills. After his review, he gives them to me.
- I process the contributions, noting any special requests regarding designated funds. In the event that the instructions on the envelope are unclear, I will place a phone call or email the donor and request clarification.

- Appropriate thank you notes are written.
- Requests for payment must come from a committee chair or appropriate staff member. Bills are paid weekly. All checks require two signatures.
- Regular financial reports are given to the Coordinator, Treasurer, Finance Committee, and Coordinating Council.
- All contributors receive a year-end financial statement.

- An annual audit is done by a licensed Certified Public Accountant.

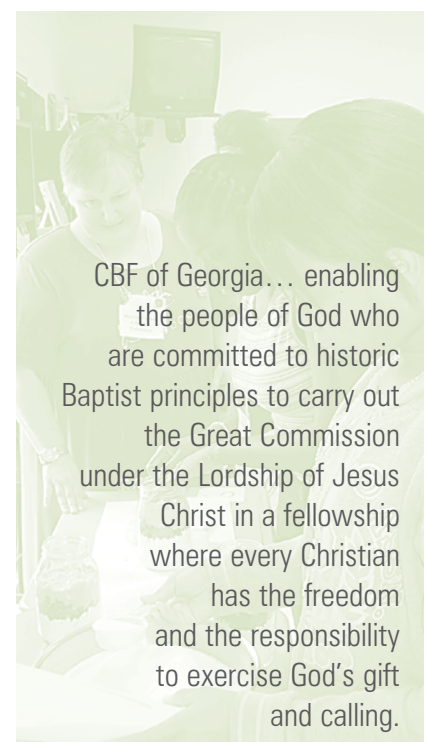
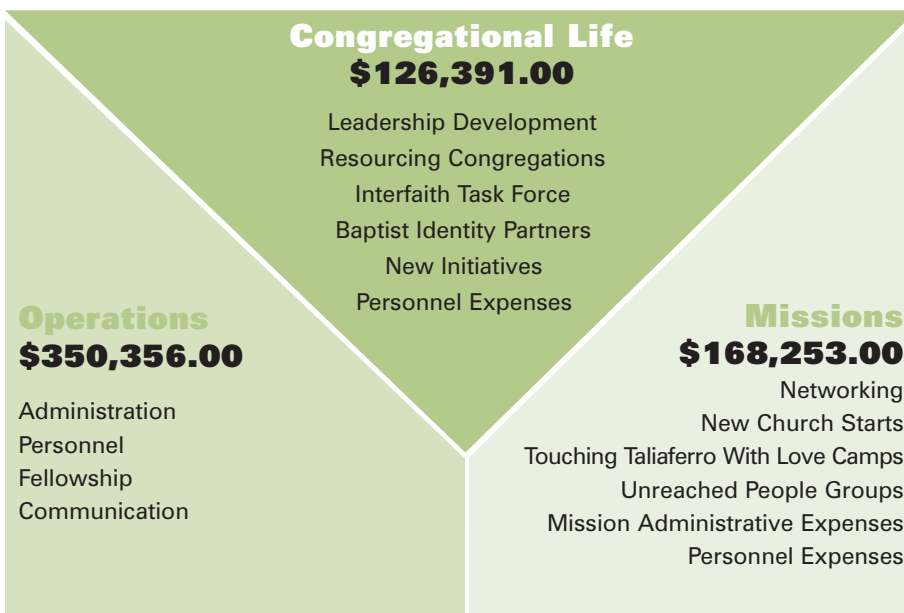

"One of the many projects your generous giving has helped make possible is a mobile medical clinic that serves some of the poorest and sickest communities I have ever seen.
