Frankly speaking

My youngest son, Truitt, is in the eighth grade. He has been learning about the stock market. Recently he participated in an exercise on the Internet. He was given a block of money and encouraged to invest it. After doing some research, he used his make-believe money to buy several thousand shares of Qualcomm. During the next eight months the stock rose from \$25.00 a share to over \$400.00 a share. He made a virtual killing. Too bad good old dad didn't do the same with real money.

There is a lesson in this for CBF. I suspect many of us have been looking for that one thing to happen that would make CBF explode in size and influence. Either the fundamentalists would make some drastic miscue that would turn people away, or we would come up with some innovative approach that would capture the hearts and minds of Baptist folk. We have been looking for the equivalent of a religious Qualcomm.

Most stockbrokers advise us to invest in a broad range of stocks over a long period of time. They point out that the market has never gone down over a long period of time. People who have made such investments have in fact made money. No doubt they have had down days and weeks, but over the long haul the market has gone up.

CBF needs to take the long view. We need to invest in a broad range of issues over a long period of time. This would include above all, "kingdom issues." We should be talking about God's view of things, especially as it relates to servanthood, justice and mercy. Secondly, we need to invest in those issues that strengthen the local church: reaffirming our understanding of Baptist principles, resourcing local congregations, and encouraging clergy and laity as they seek places of service. Thirdly, we need to continue our support of global missions and theological education. These are our blue chip issues.

No one can promise what the future holds in the stock market or in the church market, but something tells me if we continue to invest our time, energy and money in CBF, over the long term, we will see our investment grow.

local churches, and various public service agencies. This is a weekend designed to teach youth and church leaders the importance of corporate worship, corporate play, and corporate missions.

To expand the vision of community service, March Mission Madness is encouraging churches to participate in two group efforts prior to the weekend. Each church is asked to hold a church-wide canned food drive so we can make a

contribution to the Atlanta Food Bank, one of our work sites. Church members are also asked to clean out their closets and attics, so we can bring clothes and shoes to another work site, the Salvation Army.

This year's event is at Second-Ponce de Leon Baptist Church in Atlanta. The cost is \$35 per person, which covers expenses for t-shirts, meals, recreation, program leaders, sleeping accommodations, and mission supplies. Registration forms and a non-refundable \$10 deposit per person are due on

February 18. Churches are requested to bring one adult chaperone for every eight youth.

Youth groups arrive and register Friday evening, and participate in a night of games, food, recreational events, and worship. On Saturday we load up the vans and put in five hours of mission work, and then gather for a community dinner!
