Please register by June 1, 2000. Those registered in advance will receive confirmation and a more detailed packet of information including The Children's Assembly schedule and registration/drop off procedures.

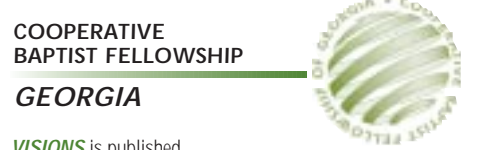

The children sing, pray and worship at Morning Celebration and Evening Worship. In Bible study the children learn skills, stories and truths through teaching and games. The boys and girls participate in a mission project and learn about missions in our state, in the United States, and with people groups around the world. They then apply what they are learning in arts, crafts and drama. Everyone has fun in recreation and free time for games and swimming. Each night of camp is an extra special time when kids play wild water games, show off their real and wacky talents, and limbo at a luau!

Do not miss out on this great opportunity for your children to learn and play together. Camp is held at the New Ebenezer Retreat Center in Rincon GA, just outside of Savannah. ## CBF of Georgia Associate Coordinator Named

*Ann White Morton to develop twelve area networks in Georgia*



**A**nn White Morton, most recently Theology Librarian and Adjunct Professor at the James and Carolyn McAfee School of Theology, Mercer University, Atlanta, has been selected by the Executive Committee/Personnel Committee of the CBF of Georgia as the first Associate Coordinator for the CBF of Georgia. She will work to develop the twelve area networks in Georgia.

Her story is one of patience and faithfulness. At age sixteen, Ann White Morton knew she felt at home in church work, but being noted as the "youth speaker" and not "youth pastor" for annual church youth weeks, she got the message. Her talents were not in the safe havens of missions and music, but in the areas of pastoral care, chaplaincy and student work. She bode her time and built her resume. She would wait for the 1980s to find her place on a church staff, and the 1990s to be ordained as a minister.

Ann was Atlanta born and lived in the Grant Park area for nine years. Her

family moved to Norcross when it was a small Southern town, and she joined the First Baptist Church. Her educational pursuit took her to Tift College in Forsyth, where she worked in the library for four years. This strong background in Baptist education and library science would direct her path for years to come.

She married Jack Morton in 1962, the same year she became a Graduate Assistant at the Candler Library at Emory

University, and a member of the First Baptist Church of Decatur. After graduation from Emory with a Master of Science in Library Science, she enjoyed archival work with the Robert Frost collection in the McCain Library at Agnes Scott College in Decatur.

The birth of son Walter Edward Morton in 1966 was followed by the arrival of another son, Brian Herschel Morton in 1969, and a daughter, Mary Allison Morton in 1974. During these years, Ann held Executive Secretary positions with the Georgia Library Association, Southeastern Library Association, and Friends of the Atlanta Public Library.

In 1985, Ann became librarian in the Division of Library and Information Management at Emory University. Joining the church staff at Briarlake Baptist in Decatur part-time in 1989, she

became Director of Senior Adult Ministry. The 1980s reaffirmed her sense of calling to denominational work. She felt "at home" at church and in the Emory theological environment. "The compelling voice within that would not consent to silence," were the words that kept calling her to begin her theological education.

Ann graduated from Emory University in Atlanta with a Master of Divinity in 1992, the same year her elder son earned a law degree from the University of Georgia, her younger son received his business degree from Auburn, and

her daughter graduated from Tucker High School. She enjoyed these years of sharing the discipline of scholarship with her children.

After earning her Master of Divinity, Ann became Minister of Family Care at Briarlake Baptist Church.

From 1995 to 1999 she was Theology Librarian/Adjunct Professor at the James

and Carolyn McAfee School of Theology, Mercer University, Atlanta.

Seeing how God has brought her to this new position of Associate Coordinator, Ann says the best of times are now. She says she is ready to "make up for lost time, doing double time in the fast lane." She has found her home in Baptist life with the CBF of Georgia.

### By-laws amendment proposed

We recommend amending the CBF of Georgia By-laws, Article IX, which now reads:

*This Constitution may be amended at any State General Assembly of Cooperative Baptist Fellowship of Georgia by a two-thirds majority of members present and voting, provided that the proposed amendment shall have been submitted in writing to the Coordinating Council thirty (30) days prior to the Council meeting next preceding the General Assembly, and made available to those attending the General Assembly at least one business meeting prior to voting on the amendment.*

to read as follows:

*These By-laws may be amended at the spring General Assembly or Fall Convocation of the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship by a two-thirds majority of members present and voting, provided that the proposed amendment shall have been submitted in writing to the Coordinating Council and published in the CBF newsletter thirty (30) days prior to the meeting.*
