March Is Mission Madness!

Students from all over Georgia gathered in the city of Rome for fun, fellowship, mission service, worship, a concert, and even an old-fashioned, Greco-Roman Toga Party for March Mission Madness 2002!

An intense weekend schedule kept the participants busy as 344 people arrived at the Friday night registration, and an additional 109 youth and adults arrived on Saturday evening to participate in the remaining activities.

To the delight and dismay of the MMM Steering

event would not have happened without the outpouring of service and love from FBC Rome. The members and staff, led by Minister of Youth and Missions, Phil Smith, welcomed 29 other church groups.

Phil also orchestrated 16 mission project sites for the youth and adults, who painted six houses



(in one day!), served senior citizens, and worked with various local ministry groups, such as Morningstar Baptist Treatment Services, Good Neighbor Ministries, Hospitality House, Open Door Home, Rebecca Blaylock Development Center, Rome Housing Authority, Habitat for Humanity, Boys and Girls Club, and the Salvation Army.

Committee, registration filled to capacity quickly. Additional groups were invited to organize mission projects closer to their home churches and then make their way to Rome on Saturday afternoon, as the event ended on Sunday morning.

NYC Mission Team Experiences Restoration

Twenty-five Georgians built walls, hung sheet rock, constructed steps, wired a basement, built an awning, taught children, told stories, sang songs, and laughed and prayed together on the third CBF of Georgia sponsored trip to New York in April 2002.

The mission team consisted of members of Augusta, Harlem, Marietta, and Toccoa First Baptist churches. They worked for a week renovating the basement of the Greater Restoration Baptist Church of Brooklyn, New York, and assisting with the children in the church day school.

Jimmie Lewis, head coach at Harlem High School said, "For the first time I felt like a complete Christian, doing mission work as the Lord wants us to do. It was a mission that brought me closer to God and other people."

Harlem pastor, Philip Vestal reflected, "The trip helped our church realize that God wants to use *us* to make a difference in the lives of people. God really does desire to use *our* gifts to impact His kingdom. Second, many of us received a 'perspective check.' Eyes were opened."

William Smith, a sophomore at Harlem High School agrees, "The trip made me realize how fortunate I am, and that all people have goodness in their hearts." Ben Hill, another youth added, "I saw what these kids went through, and yet they still want to learn and worship God."

Junior Michael Hawkinberry said, "The trip helped me realize the many types of people in the world have one common need...Jesus Christ."

Vestal continues, "Third, the trip connected us to the larger picture. We gained a greater appreciation that we're not alone in doing missions, and by partnering with CBF of Georgia and the Greater Restoration Baptist Church of Brooklyn, our church was able to network in a way it has never done before.

"Finally, this mission trip has propelled us to a new era in missions life." Tyler Holley, a senior at Harlem High School concurs, "The trip was a total learning experience for me. I now see what missions is all about, and I clearly see the opportunities for missions in Harlem, Georgia."

10 Years Yield 100 Leaders

The following article is the fourth in a series recounting the first ten years of CBF of Georgia. Written by Robert G. Gardner, Senior Researcher in Baptist History at the Jack Tarver Library of Mercer University, the articles are condensed excerpts from A Decade of Freedom and Faithfulness: The Cooperative Baptist Fellowship of Georgia 1992-2002, authored by Dr. Gardner and published in February 2002. During the past decade, we've had two kinds of leaders in the Georgia CBF. No, not good and bad! Instead, volunteer and professional. Today, let's name some of the names and express our appreciation for each of the nearly 100 persons who would be included in a complete list.

Eleven persons have led the Fellowship as moderators: W. Ches Smith III, Tifton, 1992; Billy T. Nimmons, Dalton, 1992-1994; Pearl DuVall, Cordele, 1994-1995; David K. Hinson, LaFayette, 1995-1996; Janie Peacock, West Point, 1996-1997; Jon Appleton, Athens, 1997-1998; Carolyn B. Massey, Tifton, 1998-1999; Gary L. Abbott, Sr., Milledgeville, 1999-2000; Becky Matheny, Athens, 2000-2001; Jim Ross, Madison, 2001-2002; Rachel Deems, Macon, 2002-2003. Five are female, six, male. All six males are ordained ministers and are or were pastors of churches. Two females are ordained ministers and another, an ordained deacon. Three laywomen have been named to this office, but no layman has as yet occupied this position.

Six have served as clerks: John D. Baker, Atlanta, 1993-1996; Nona Junkin, St. Simons, 1996; Sarah B. Withers, McDonough, 1996-2000; Michael Helms, Moultrie, 2000-2001; Anne Green, Dahlonga, 2001-2002; Katie Fowler, Milledgeville, 2002-present. The two men are clergy; the others are laity.

The CBF has thus far elected three treasurers: John D. Baker, Atlanta, 1993-1997; Darrell Watson, Macon, 1997-1999; and Ruth DuCharme, Macon, 1999-present. Both men were pastors of churches; the female is a layperson. (EDITOR: Ruth DuCharme is scheduled to be ordained to the gospel ministry in August 2002.)

Since 1992, 89 persons have been on the coordinating council, 49 males and 40 females. The breakdown of the group is as follows: male clergy, 34; male laity, 15; female clergy, 10; female laity, 30, of whom two are deacons. The council initiates most of the activities of the Fellowship or, when it does not, supervises the ongoing programs. Without it the existence of our state Fellowship would be virtually inconceivable.

From the first day the volunteer leaders knew that a full-time staff would be needed if the Fellowship were to achieve its maximum efficiency in service. In 1997 requisite financial maturity was reached, and Rev. E. Frank Broome was named the first full-time coordinator. From his office, his home, and his automobile he conducts a wide-ranging mission on behalf of the Fellowship: overseeing its every activity, maintaining a broad correspondence, speaking at every opportunity, counseling churches and clergy, sending resumes of worthy ministers and staff, and originating new ideas that might lead to new ministries. His office is located on Mercer University property in space furnished without charge by the university and said in 2001 to be worth about \$8,000 per year.

In the spring of 2000, Rev. Ann White Morton became part-time associate coordinator, with a major responsibility to strengthen CBF within the 12 geographical areas of Georgia. Her term of service concluded in 2002.

Rev. Jimmy Lewis joined the staff in the spring of 2001 as full-time missions coordinator. Supporting and expanding CBF/GA mission work in the state and around the world occupies his time and energies.

In all of this, the professional leaders have been capably assisted by four office-based colleagues: Sheryl Groover, 1997-present; Surelle K. Pinkston, 1997-present; Stacy Cox, 2001-present; and Carol Jones, 2001-present. Two generous ladies have worked many volunteer hours in the office: Katie Fowler of Milledgeville and Nancy Long of Macon.

called the students "a gift" to Rome. "They'll be here giving of themselves to our community," she said, "I think what they're doing is really admirable."

As true for each year of Madness, the amount of work accomplished was amazing. Participants collectively served 2,064 hours in the Rome community! Students and their chaperones made quite an impact.

The *Rome News-Tribune* said, "While some teens were cheering their favorite teams toward a national college championship

Saturday, a group of about 400 youth missionaries were busy in Rome reaching goals of their own."

The beneficiaries of the work performed as well as other Roman citizens were grateful for the presence of Madness participants. In an editorial, the *Rome News-Tribune* said, "The recent appearance in the community of about 400 young missionaries from across the state for a weekend of performing good deeds was a positive event in a world that sometimes appears to dwell only on the negatives of existence."

"It is the sort of good news badly needed to offset the sometimes undue attention given to the much-smaller number of human beings who generate bad news in our times. It also provides members of this community not only with a lesson but also a challenge."

The kingdom of God was made known by the selfless expressions of love and acts of service made by all who participated. God's presence and the good news of Jesus were further expressed during each worship service led by several students and Valerie and Allan Burton, who provided a meaningful connective thread to the experience of all who served, worshipped, and fellowshiped throughout the weekend.

May God continue to work in the lives of young people through opportunities for mission service, as there may be two such opportunities for madness next year!!!
