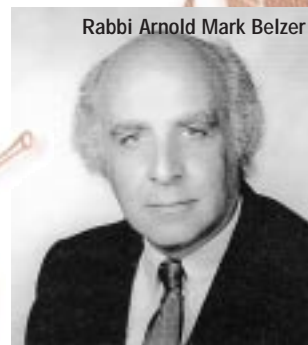

Educating for the 21st Century

McAfee and Candler insure bright future for Georgia Baptists

B Bold, new, cutting edge—these are the realities of theological education today. The Cooperative Baptist Fellowship partners with 11 seminaries, theology schools, and Baptist houses of study, preparing the next generation of leadership for God's service.

It's inspiring to know that nine of the 11 CBF partner schools were founded in the 1990s. Over 1,350 students are now enrolled in these frontier programs, bringing a fresh face to the future of our churches and mission fields.

CBF of Georgia has a special relationship with the Baptist Studies Program in the Candler School of Theology at Emory University and the McAfee School of Theology at Mercer University, both located in Atlanta.

The partnerships are nurtured through:

- Providing scholarship money to Georgia students attending those schools,

- Hosting an orientation meal to incoming students at which the coordinator, moderator, and avenue chairs inform students of the purpose and mission of CBF of Georgia,

- Acting as a liaison between students and churches for part-time and full-time positions as pastor or staff,

- Helping spouses find employment,

- Providing *Visions* newsletters to each student,

- Providing information on CBF of Georgia churches,

- Employing students in CBF of Georgia programs such as March Mission Madness and New Horizons Camp, and

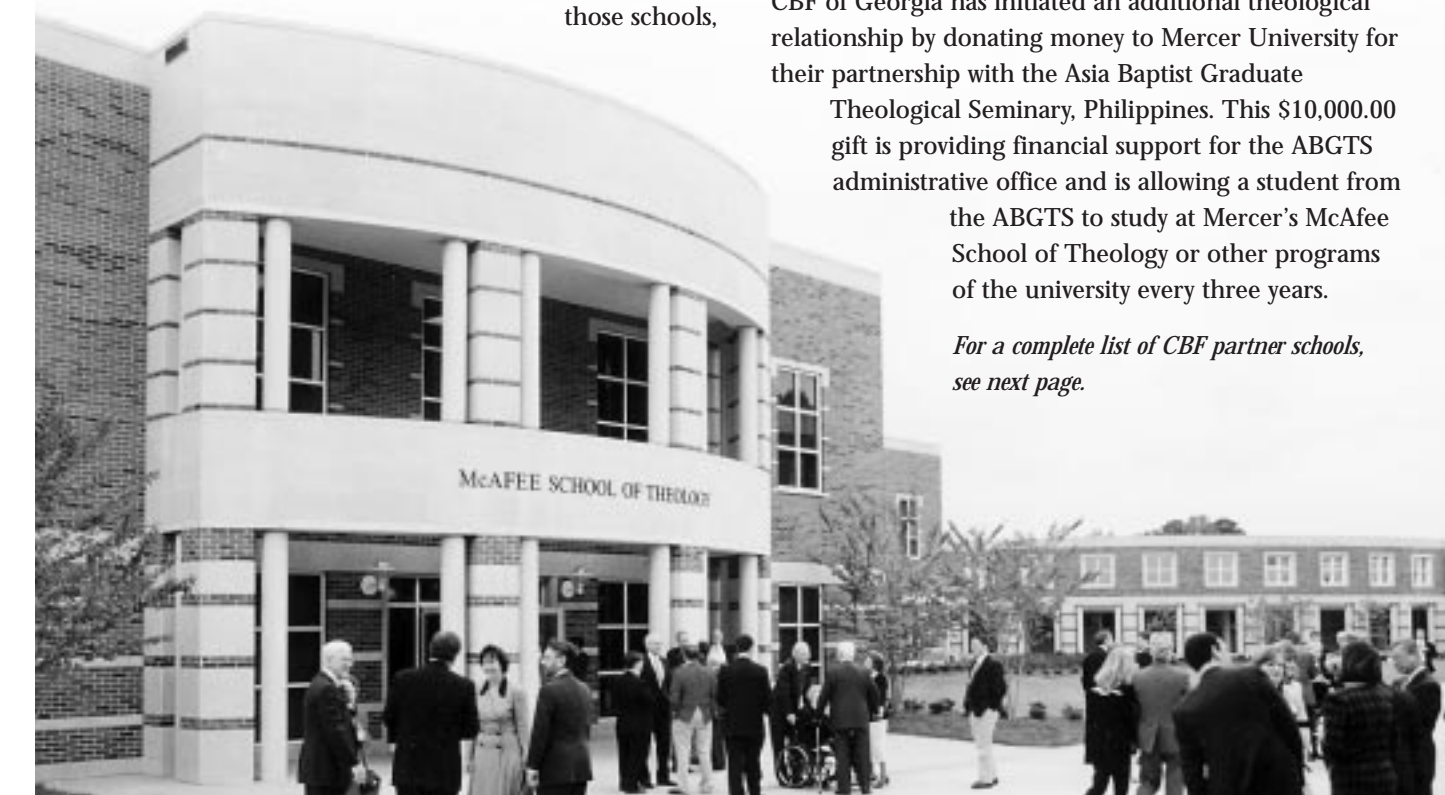
- Providing scholarships for students to attend the National General Assembly, CBF of Georgia General Assembly and Fall Convocation, and educational conferences in Georgia.

CBF of Georgia has initiated an additional theological relationship by donating money to Mercer University for their partnership with the Asia Baptist Graduate

Theological Seminary, Philippines. This \$10,000.00 gift is providing financial support for the ABGTS administrative office and is allowing a student from

the ABGTS to study at Mercer's McAfee School of Theology or other programs of the university every three years.

Dr. Jim Dant serves as pastor of Highland Hills Baptist Church in Macon, Georgia, and Jeff Browne, fellow parishioner, is a partner in the engineering firm of Hodges Harbin Newberry & Tribble.

Together, Jim and Jeff have co-produced a CD entitled *A Morningstar Christmas*. All proceeds from the sale of the CD benefit Morningstar Baptist Treatment Services, Inc.

State CBF offices do not appoint anyone. We simply help people get together. The real work falls on the search committee and the candidate. They must carefully and prayerfully build trust with each other. Out of that trust comes the possibility of a lasting relationship that is good for both pastor and people.

Most, if not all, the resumes I receive are from self described “moderate” individuals. Requests come from churches that may or may not define themselves as “moderate” yet seek moderate-styled leadership.

Many churches are still unsure about the word “moderate,” while most of the pastors I hear from are very clear. They want to be in a moderate church. I long for the day when that incongruity is less apparent. That will happen when both clergy and laity decide to make it so.

Search Committees and CBF...

To be honest, I have been surprised how much of my time is devoted to working with search committees from local churches, especially those looking for a pastor. About twelve churches are searching for a pastor at any given moment. Another dozen or so are looking for staff. We have about fifty active resumes on file at the moment. Most of them are from pastors.

Helping a church find a pastor is an interesting process. It usually begins with a phone call, e-mail, or letter to my office. That leads to a general discussion with the chair of the search committee. In many cases I am invited to lead a training session with the entire committee present. These can last from one to two hours depending on the needs and interests of the committee. Following the training session I send a number of resumes to the committee based on what they have told me about their church.

I continue to stay in contact with the church if it so chooses. Additional resumes are sent as they become available. Often a church needs help determining compensation and benefits. I do my best to provide appropriate information based on similar churches in their area of the state. While this is unfolding I am often contacted by some of the individual ministers. They, of course, want to know about the church, its size, general characteristics,

We want to love, not hate, and we want to open our arms to the minority.

I hope CBF of Georgia is known for doing things differently. I believe that is what Jesus came to teach. Maybe we are beginning to get the message.
