New Horizons Camp: Color Your World

Color Your World was the theme at New Horizons Camp 2002. Over 100 third through fifth graders from all over Georgia attended camp and learned how to make a difference by sharing God's love.

Through Bible stories written by Kim Hardegree of National Heights Baptist Church, children learned about people who made their world a brighter place through God's love. Noah, the Good Samaritan, and the Parable of the Sower painted fresh pictures in the minds of the children.

"In worship each night, by teaching Bible stories of children who made a difference, we helped them understand that children have a special calling to color their world. Stories of Samuel, Jeremiah, David, and the boy who shared his lunch demonstrated that they do not have to grow up to make an impact in the lives of others, explained Jana Kinnersley, New Horizons Camp director.

"Camp pastors Doug Ivey of Carlton Baptist Church and Wendy Joyner of Fellowship Baptist Church in Americus shared their messages to the children with great energy and creativity. There was even a rap song about David defeating Goliath and a Mad Lib about Samuel's calling!"

CBF curriculum was utilized to teach children about missions on local, state and global levels. Sonya Milam of FBC Macon facilitated an aging process simulation in which children learned what it must be like to live with arthritis and visual and hearing impairments. The children discussed ways they could minister to people they know who are dealing with such ailments.

The camp theme was also promoted in arts and crafts led by Marie May, a student at the University of Georgia, and Mary Matheny, a high school student from Second-Ponce de Leon Baptist Church in Atlanta. To color their world, each child made a brightly

colored bird feeder as a gift for someone in his or her community. The children also made their missions offering by creating and painting home decor items that will fill "Welcome Home" baskets given to families on the day they move into their new home built by Habitat for Humanity.

Drama was used to reinforce the concept of coloring your world by sharing God's love with others. The Bible stories became skits and even liturgical dance by Lanee Buchanon, a high school student from Duluth, and Doug Grogan of FBC Macon. The skits were presented by the children each night in worship, only one of many ways the children led in worship.

Jana concludes, "The camp staff knew we were making a difference in our world when Wendy Joyner asked on the last night, 'Who is a minister?' A little girl on the back row stood up and pointed to herself! What an answer!"

"If we could raise up a generation of children who live every day as ministers of the Gospel, called to share God's love with others, what a colorful world it would be!"

On August 14, 2002, the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship of Georgia purchased a 4,700 square foot office building at 2465 Hillcrest Avenue in Macon. The building was constructed in the early 1960s by the Boy Scouts of America and was used by them until recently. The purchase price was \$110,000, and it will take approximately \$45,000 to make the necessary improvements. We hope to move before January 1, 2003.

For the past five years we have been guests of Mercer University at the 400 Poplar Street building. Thanks to the leadership of Janie Peacock, Jon Appleton, Carolyn Massey, and the generosity of Mercer University, especially Kirby Godsey and Emily Myers, we have been able to use this excellent facility. Our staff has grown from one full-time and two part-time to three full time coordinators, two full-time assistants, and two part-time assistants. Thus the need for more space.

Yes, this will mean additional costs in utilities, security, and maintenance. In the long run it will enable us to better serve our churches and expand the influence of our fellowship in Georgia. Many of you have inquired about making a donation to replace the funds we borrowed from our savings account. The cost of the project including improvements will average \$40.00 per square foot. Let me encourage you to purchase a square foot in honor or memory of someone. We have started a list of such gifts. Help us make it a long one.

memos from the missions coordinator



The Fall Convocation at Marietta First Baptist Church has the potential to be life changing. Not only do we have the opportunity to hear from Tony Campolo, we will also hear what the past has been and what the future holds for missions through CBF of Georgia.

You can actually participate in the future of the sharing of the Gospel in Bosnia. Your missions coordinator had an opportunity to visit the Baptist church in Sarajevo. The progress the church and people have made in the last few years is phenomenal. They have come to a time when God is calling out an indigenous ministry to share the Gospel all through Bosnia-Herzegovina. The need for training is critical.

The church in Sarajevo has started a Baptist Institute to train new pastors. There is a program for residential students and another for non-residential. I had an opportunity to meet some of the students who are living at the school. Their commit-

ment to their calling is amazing.

One of the non-residential students is a lady from Tuzla, a 12 hour drive from Sarajevo. She drives on a regular basis to attend school. Her husband was killed in the war and she is alone to care for her family. She has also committed to take care of a newly developing family of God. She needs training!

We have no idea the needs and opportunities which exist as pastors are called to minister to people affected by the terrible war of the past. They need training to deal with post traumatic stress syndrome and how to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Most of the students speak English. You can help by providing books needed in the library at the Baptist Institute. There will be a place at the Fall Convocation for you to contribute your old or new theology books

CBFGA 1992-2002: Activities for Children & Youth

—The following article is the sixth in a series recounting the first ten years of CBF of Georgia. Written by Robert G. Tons of play” was what the teenagers were promised — but the number of tons was never specified. The amount must have been sufficient, however, for children and youth have been attending CBF activities in great and growing numbers.

New Horizons Camps. New Horizons children’s camps for those who have completed grades 3-5 have been held since 1994. Initially a successful ministry under Rachel Lackey and Eileen Campbell-Reed at Heritage Baptist Church, Cartersville, it received limited funds from National CBF during its first two years. Since then the Georgia CBF has provided financial support.

At first the camp moved from place to place: Rockridge Baptist Assembly, near Franklin, in 1994; Burnt Mountain Baptist Assembly, near Jasper, in 1995 and 1997; and Shorter College, Rome, in 1996.

Since 1998 the camp has regularly used the facilities of the New Ebenezer Retreat Center, Rincon, near Savannah. Usually one four-day experience has been offered, although several times a second session has been scheduled. About 35 children came to the first camp, and 86 to the second. One hundred sixty children and staffers were present in 2001.

Activities include Bible study, crafts, drama, worship, and recreation. Wacky Water Games and Show Off Crazy Talent Night produce sometimes unexpected results. The children learn about Global Missions in daily classes and have at times participated in hands-on missions activities in the vicinity of the camp. In 1998 Wendy Joyner and Sarah Withers were the camp pastors, providing a unique experience for most of the campers. Significant leadership has been provided by Lackey, Campbell-Reed, Jennifer Britt, Connie Campbell, and Jana Kinnersley. Over the years the CBF of Georgia has spent almost \$33,000 of its budget for this activity, recently including a modest stipend for the increasingly busy part-time director.

What could be more appropriate than introducing future CBF leaders to New Horizons that eventually include a Madness for Missions?

March Mission Madness Weekends. Finding that their youth were responding negatively to conventional activities, several ministers of youth sparked by Angela Oxford, then of Macon, decided to create their own events. For two or three days in March, since 1997 a program for teenagers has been scheduled in Griffin, Milledgeville, Decatur, Atlanta, Morningstar Treatment Services, and Rome.

Working on Habitat for Humanity projects, with councils for the aging, with social service agencies such as the Salvation Army, Loaves and Fishes, St. Vincent DePaul Clothes Line, and Atlanta Community Food Bank, and with the Morningstar organization, participants have contributed as many as 2,088 hours of service in a single weekend.

Attendance has grown dramatically from 70 youth and adults in 1997, to 260 in 1999, to a high of 380 youth and staff in 2000. Twenty-five to thirty churches are now consigning their young members to this form of Madness that has been led by Oxford, Kurt Varney, Carmen Homola-Brock and Ben Homola, and Scott Ford. Almost \$54,000 of the CBFG budget has gone for this and other youth activities, including in recent years a sum for the coordinator(s).

What could be more appropriate than introducing future CBF leaders to New Horizons that eventually include a Madness for Missions?
